cil is assessing a development application from Offida Holdings Pty Ltd for the remaining four stages of its Bargara sub-division, to be accessed from Wearing Rd.

The lots are along an already

The lots are along an already completed section of the Hughes Rd extension, with work on the road continuing.
When complete, the Hughes Rd extension will provide a direct route to Bargara from Back Windermere Rd.

The council's planning and development spokesman Ross Sommerfeld said the extension provided better access and more options for vehicles to travel the coastal region.

'Now we are seeing the op-Now we are seeing the op-portunity for more and more development to thrive, includ-ing the Wearing Rd subdivi-sion, with this latest applica-tion proposing an additional 26 lots," he said.

The site is about 2km from

Rifle Range Beach and 5km south of central Bargara.
Stage 1 and 2 are complete and under construction, and if approved Stage 3 will include seven lots and a remaining 19 lots identified across stages 4, 5

the wider community through cultural awareness.

Mr Sinclair said Bundaberg's Chinese sister city relationship with Nanning provided a great opportunity to build up international student numbers, but there were many factors which needed to be considered to nake it a viable prospect

"Accommodation, the transport infrastructure that's in place in the town and the course options that we've got," he said.

There's a lot to consider when it comes to working out accommodation, but options being floated are ones that could potentially be used for a

number of purposes

"It's about developing a busi-"It's about developing a busi-ness case that's representative not just of a single uses, it's got to be multi-use," he said. "It's got to be suitable for stu-

dents but also potentially the corporate sector, for sporting events and entertainment, and that's been the challenge but

ve've been in discussions with stakeholders and it's beginning to get some momentum." Whether accommodation was in the CBD or on campus,

Mr Sinclair said providing transport between the two was vital, with a half hourly shuttle hetween the two, one of the op tions being considered

"The students want security,

they want access to shopping and cafes," he said. Mr Sinclair said short term plans to boost international study groups included increasing the numbers who currently travelled to Bundaberg for short-term study tours.
